This Spring marks the 101st anniversary of the infamous Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire. It was on March 25, 1911, that 146 mostly young, female, immigrant workers died needlessly because their factory door was locked and the building was unsafe. Outrage over this tragedy strengthened the New York labor movement and changed the labor and fire safety laws that continue to protect us today!

But, incredibly, today there are still virtually NO monuments to honor workers, especially working women.
